

1 Team Rainbow Qld Background

After extensive community discussions in 2016, the Manager of Plantation Resort took the initiative to host a public meeting on 16 March 2017, at his Café, for Rainbow Beach ('Rainbow', as the village is known, colloquially) interested residents, to create a group, to commit to working together.

The group would be, but not limited to, helping with existing events and include (not exclude) members into the network.

A follow-up meeting was held at the same venue, on 12 April 2017, for those persons who completed an EOI Form as their commitment to formally join the new group. Attendees voted to form Team Rainbow. Just prior to this meeting, Team Rainbow had already convinced a Triathlon event to return to Rainbow on 2-3 September 2017, after vowing not to return, after their last experience of being treated poorly by several businesses in town. The change in culture energised residents, particularly those new to the area. The Double Tri became an annual event.



2 About Team Rainbow Queensland

Founded in 2017, Team Rainbow Queensland promotes sport, fitness, and healthy lifestyles among Queensland's diverse community. We help connect and promote member organisations and individuals who are non-discriminatory and welcome the participation of all people. We support inclusion and diversity.

Team Rainbow was the first not-for-profit, community organisation to set about to unite towns/cities that are not large enough to have their own incorporated Group, Insurances, Website, Board, etc across Queensland.

Team Rainbow is a not-for-profit registered charity staffed by volunteers and is Queensland's only member of InterPride (Hosts WorldPride) and the Federation of Gay Games (Hosts Gay Games).

Team Rainbow represents its member organisations at regional and international, inclusive, sporting events, such as the long running, Gay Games – the World's largest Sporting and Cultural Event.



We achieve this objective by hosting and promoting events and, welcoming and encouraging new members.

3 President's 2024 Report Ms Ann-Marie Lavers-Grimm



When I was first elected as Team Rainbow's President, I immediately thought about what I could contribute.

It was important to welcome back to Rainbow, the **Double Triathlon** event from the previous year, because TR had promoted that participants would be warmly welcomed to Rainbow. We went on to host Australia's first Pride House, a Chess Comp, a Light & Sound Exhibition, as well as our regular annual events.

Team Rainbow's commitment to participation in the Mardi Gras Parade came to fruition when our Application to the Mardi Gras Board was approved to participate in the 45th Anniversary of the Mardi Gras Parade on 25 February 2023, that was combined with Australia's first WorldPride.

Team Rainbow Queensland voted (the only vote from a Queensland Member Organisation) for Sydney to Host WorldPride.

The Board has maintained sufficient Officers to fulfil its events throughout the year.

To avoid some Directors fulfilling multiple roles, new Board members are always welcome and invited to nominate their interest, so that Team Rainbow can continue to maintain its support, to promoting a healthy lifestyle, to our inclusive community, in whatever way feasible.

On 24 August 2024, Team Rainbow marked its 7th anniversary since its incorporated formation. Our continued presence on the Rainbow scene is only due to the support from our sponsors, volunteers, and members.

On 23 July 2023, Team Rainbow was approved as a Registered Charity by the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission.




6 Team Rainbow Stairway to the Beach



9.3 Gay Games XI: Hong Kong/Guadalajara: 3-11 Nov 2023

For the first time in the history of the Gay Games, the event was Co-hosted in both Hong Kong and Guadalajara.



Summary of GGXI by Roger Bringham:

If you read the superficial news reports and commentaries published in the final days leading up to the Gay Games events held in Hong Kong and Guadalajara, Mexico, you would have expected sparsely attended tournaments populated by athletes ducking bullets fired by Mexican cartels or constantly looking over their shoulders expecting to be kidnapped by communist party security officers.



If you participated in the events, you would have found what is always present at the Gay Games: athletes and artists having the most joyous times of their lives overcoming obstacles and critics while transforming those around them for the better.



In many ways, these may have been the most revolutionary and impactful Gay Games since the inaugural Gay Games four decades ago in San Francisco. That may sound unbelievable to the journalism hacks who pooh-poohed the Games before they even happened, but then they weren't competing or volunteering. They missed the magic.



Leading up to Gay Games XI, which was delayed by one year and divided between two locales for the first time ever because of the onset of COVID-19 and Hong Kong's imposition of severe travel restrictions, many news media focused on the unique challenges facing the Gay Games. They implied failure was inevitable. They ignored the unique opportunities and the extraordinary work that went into capitalising on those opportunities.



Political opponents in Hong Kong accused the Gay Games of trying to instil "Western values" for full acceptance of LGBTQ rights such as marriage equality and antidiscrimination protections for housing and jobs. Guilty! If the Gay Games didn't stand by such values, there wouldn't be much need for their existence.






I saw athletes competing with the same fervour they always have. I saw coaches coaching, teammates partying and dining out together, and everyone rejoicing at the opportunity we had to compete with each other again. (By the way: best food ever for a host city and unbelievably inexpensive.)



I was honoured to <u>receive</u> the Federation of Gay Games highest Honour, the Tom Waddell Award, during the opening ceremonies. I was asked to give a brief speech accepting the award. I planned to talk about the importance of volunteering, and then give thanks at the end to Guadalajara.



But as I sat in the stands waiting my turn at the microphone, I was enchanted by the sight of all of the volunteers scrambling backstage to make things happen. I saw joy and pride on anonymous faces, each expressing deep enjoyment at having the chance to make the event happen. I attended the first two Gay Games in San Francisco, and have participated in every Gay Games starting with the 2006 event in Chicago. Never have I seen such unfettered, spontaneous joy on the faces of the volunteers.



And then the impact we were having on the lives of these volunteers hit me. I realised that although Guadalajara in recent years had been slowly building a reputation as an LGBTQ-friendly tourist town, never had its queerfolk had this kind of opportunity to shine in the spotlight, to garner attention supportive rather than hostile or indifferent. I suddenly understood why they had been willing to step in at the last minute under less than ideal circumstances. They had to know that after having failed in two previous bid cycles, hosting now would cost them any real chance to host in the future under more ideal circumstances. The inflated numbers by which mass media judged Gay Games didn't matter to them; helping to make the Gay Games possible for the athletes who needed it now did.



So, I changed my speech. I thanked them for stepping in on short notice to save the Gay Games during a deep existential crisis, much as Chicago had done decades ago. I told them no one could ever deny their role in history. I told them that for me, Guadalajara meant love.



So yeah, attendance numbers overall were down. I don't think that had much to do with politics or the global economy or the alleged changing role of global events for LGBTQ sports.



Remember the early days of COVID? Remember all the social behaviours, such as working in offices or gathering for parties or shopping in grocery stores, which came grinding to a halt? Remember how nearly every sports event was cancelled? Remember how when things started to normalise, a lot of people refused to return to offices and decided to change jobs, even careers?



A year or two ago, when many athletes normally would have been training for tournaments such as the Gay Games, they were not. They may have lost vacation time with job changes, or moved on to other more manageable interests.



A lot of LGBTQ sports clubs did not survive that disruption. Many folded; others took to Zoom training sessions. Some individuals trained on their own and lost connections with their teams.



So, participation levels were destined to be down this cycle regardless. These Gay Games were not numerical failures; they were successes built on shared values and commitments. They were testaments to the value and strength of the inclusive sports movement even in the face of overwhelming global challenges.



A mere five thousand willing to duke it out in Guadalajara and Hong Kong? That's great news for Valencia, host of Gay Games XII 2026, in Spain.


